

- Work to protect and enhance the biodiversity of the region
- Facilitate weed and pest control in partnership with community, government and individuals

- The two-year 'Innovative Solutions to Controlling Agricultural Weeds' project concluded with a follow up field day at the trial site at Fish Creek in April 2018.
- The four-year 'Healthy Soils, Sustainable Farms' project, (funded by the Australian Governments National Landcare program coordinated by the West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority) concluded on June 30, 2018 with a number of field days, soil plans, and the Soilkee renovator trial site being finalized throughout the year.
 - * A field day to explore the results of the trial was held in May 2018 at Ross and Madeline Battens property at Buffalo. Results of the trial are available via https://www.wgcma.vic.gov.au/for-landholders/gippsland-soil-trials/soilkee-renovator-soil-pasture-demonstration

 - * Six soil management plans were developed for grazing properties by Agriculture Consultant, Lisa Warne
- The four-year 'Demonstrating Sustainable Farm Practices' project, (funded by the Australian Governments National Landcare Program coordinated by Western Port Catchment Landcare Network) concluded on June 30 2018 with a number of field days, demonstration sites and case studies finalized
 - * A field day exploring the results of controlling azolla in farm dams was held at the Torwood property of Bob Grey in November 2017
 - * A field day exploring the economics of agroforestry versus conventional grazing was also held at Bob Grey's in November 2017
 - Case studies for these trial sites, as well as a trial site looking at mitigation techniques for tunnel erosion, were developed and can be found via http://www.wpcln.org.au/resources/case-studies/
- The four-year 'Corner Inlet Connections' project, funded by the Australian Governments National Landcare
 program coordinated by the West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority) concluded on June 30, 2018
 with a report on the extent of coastal saltmarsh and mangroves in Corner Inlet produced to assist with future
 works planning
- On ground works to protect and enhance biodiversity of South Gippsland were delivered as part of two
 projects during the year
 - * The first project, 'Regional Community Grants' funded by the Australian Government and coordinated by the West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority delivered;
 - Area of revegetation completed (Ha): 18.74
 - Plants planted (No.): 20,151
 - Direct Seeding (kg of seed sown): 4
 - Length of fencing completed (km): 5.687
 - Area protected by fencing (Ha): 21.15
 - Area of weed control (Ha): 34.73
 - Weed species treated: Blackberry, ragwort, thistles, sweet reed grass, pasture grass in plantations, English ivy, willow
 - The second project, 'West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority Landcare Support Grants' delivered (at SGLN level);

24 landholders planted 1,250 plants on their properties

What has been done in this area?

- Working with and assisting the Nerrena/Tarwin Valley, Mardan Mirboo North, Franklin River and Arawata/ Mount Eccles Wild Dog Valley Landcare groups with the delivery of the 2018 West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority Landcare Support Grants
- SGLN Board members were assigned groups to act as a liaison between groups and the Network
- Assisted the Friends of Turtons Creek to become an independent group (they were previously a sub-group of SGLN)
- Processing new memberships as required
- In May SGLN hosted an event for Landcare group executives' titles 'Landcare we need to talk!". The event sought feedback from the groups on what they want to see/what support they require
- The Network continues to process memberships for SGLN members and on behalf of the Franklin River, Friends of Turtons Creek and Foster North Landcare sub-group
- Assisting the South Gippsland Equine Landcare Group with the process of formally closing
- SGLN Staff and Board members attended meetings when invited and time permits
- 'New Landholder Welcome pack' developed and distributed to real estate agents, information centres and when families join a new group
- Network staff, Board and group members encourage new landholders to join their local Landcare group
- Delivery of a 'small grants for small project' grants program as a way of engaging members and encouraging new memberships

- Biodiversity Response Planning, Threatened Invertebrate Protection in the Western Strzelecki's (Victorian State Government Grant)
- The SGLN Landcare Fund, via the SGLN Landcare Fund Committee has been actively seeking tax deductible
 donations via newsletter promotions and attendance at field days. A raffle, (of donated local produce and
 services) to raise funds was organized during the year, it will take place in November 2018
- Funding support was also provided through Michaels Super IGA Community Rewards Program

- SGLN has an active and engaging social media presence on Facebook and Twitter
- SGLN has a solid web presence with increasing resources on sustainable land use and management available
- A range of educational field day, farm walks and events were held by SLGN throughout the year including;

- An 'Attenborough Natter' event was held in May to honour the 93rd Birthday of Sir David Attenborough and highlight the profile of Landcare. The event received good coverage in print and digital media with a segment on ABC Radio Gippsland
- SGLN business partners support our projects and provide additional promotional opportunities, in particular the West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority, Michaels Super, IGA, Bass Coast Landcare Network, DELWP Gippsland, ABC Radio Gippsland and local newspapers; The South Gippsland Sentinel Times and The Great Southern Star

Allambee Community Landcare Group

Our group has a fairly constant membership with good attendance at all of our organised events/meetings throughout the year. In October we assisted the Friends of Mount Worth Group with one of their monthly working bees. On a cold and misty morning, the added numbers were welcomed to help with the distribution of gravel along parts of the walking tracks around the Moonlight Creek picnic area. A fallen tree was also cleared from the path to allow for the numerous trailer and

wheelbarrow loads of gravel to be distributed. The Mt. Worth Friends Group are to be commended on all the work they do volunteering their time in the upkeep of pathways and track maintenance of the area. Our group provided a lunch on completion of the morning's work.

A few of our members have taken up our offer of providing 150 indigenous plants for use on their property. The drier than normal conditions over summer and the increasing deer population in our area, were not ideal for plant survival, so not all members have availed themselves of the offer. Despite the lower rainfall figures, ragwort has managed to thrive over the summer, and once again there were a few grossly negligent landholders who have not maintained their weed control program. We are extremely disappointed with the lack of action and enforcement by the controlling government bodies.

The close proximity of the large Darnum/Ellinbank fire in March had all our area on high alert for a few weeks, and we were forced to enact our fire plans on the extreme weather days. Fortunately, the CFA crews, strike teams, and aerial water bombers kept us safe and eventually had things under control. Hence grants where groups need professional input as the process is technical and lethargic and this where we need facilitators. Membership was enhanced with the admission of the Wild Dog Valley/Mt Eccles LCG whom were about to go into recess and on advice from Jill Vella have elected to join ALCG which took place at our last AGM 010617. Nick assisted in applying for a grant through Jill SGLN where we were successful in getting of 5K to carry out works on "Hammons Bush" which is common ground for both Arawata and MTEC/WDVY. Nick secured the SGSC works team ably assisted by David Meikle to do significant ground works clearing and maintenance. We had a 1 bbq in December combined with a working bee and a follow up to review works in March where we returned to the hall for the meeting.

DEDJTER continue to be a blocker when responding to calls for weed complaints. There continues to be a groundswell of angst regarding the bland replies with the large infestations of ragwort and blackberry. This season has been very responsive for weeds and now with the odd farmer electing to be become organic we need to remind them that they still have to comply with the community standard.

Danny O'Brien in consultation with the CWTF managed to coordinate an executive meeting with representatives of Jaala Pulford Team convened at the CMA office Leongatha. This meeting with prominent members of concern reminded the team that their performance is extremely poor where we had met all the expectations regarding community engagement however lacked their support to implement enforcement. Several members really laid it on the line and we found lies in their delivery whether they were in consultation with the opposition party with respect to forthcoming elections.

"We need to talk" workshop with lunch at Djinta Djinta organised 11-05-18 by the network where 20 participants from most groups and some BCLC network delegates also. This was facilitated by Michelle Croker from Yackandandah and Craig Kenny who has recently purchased land at Trida. This discussion was to ensure a vibrant future for Landcare and dealt with strategic plans, cooperation, cluster, vitality, demands, health of groups/Landcare, education and projects.

Tarwin Landcare Group

My vision remains the continuation of the work of protecting and preserving our natural places and repairing degraded areas through regeneration and revegetation. A vision I'm sure is shared by all our members.

Last month Ray and Debbie represented our executive at a South Gippsland Landcare Network workshop at Djinta Djinta, with Landcarers from a number of local groups. It was good to have Kate Williams/McKenzie back in her role and acknowledge the work of Jill Vella in holding the maternity leave position.

It was interesting to have a bigger

picture view of what's working, what's not, opportunities and gaps, facilitated by Michelle and Craig. Data from 2013, 2014, 2016 and 2018 was presented, with many themes repeated over those five years, and across the groups in our network, presumably further afield too.

Across our network, there were many positive projects and achievements, relating to soils, revegetation, weed and pest control, site visits, land management, partnerships, sharing expertise, skills development, practical experience and support, and social and community connection. All goals of Landcare Australia.

On the other hand, there were many shared frustrations, including committee fatigue, changing demographics, limited funding, reduced capacity, ageing members, and attracting members especially young people. In many areas, like ours, farmers had done so much work in the past, they want now to maintain it.

Groups overall were described as "tired but buoyant", perhaps somewhat accurate of our own group, hanging in there rather enthusiastically, with many great ideas, but limited time, money and person-power to implement them. Of course, groups go through cycles of activity, rest and maintenance, just as nature does.

Succession planning within Landcare groups was an issue, with often limited offers to take office positions. Our group has a policy of maximum three-year term for president position, so I'm inviting all members to start thinking about 2019.

Ray and Debbie attended the Network AGM at Mirboo North in October 2017, it was a great night and we encourage members to attend in future years.

Our group summary of interests and projects includes the same nine major areas of focus and concern. These were farmland care, small landholders, township spaces, indigenous nursery, diversity and education, wildlife habitat and care, parks and reserves, indigenous and history, and river/ waterways.

Our biggest and ongoing project is the Shared Pathway revegetation between

Venus Bay and Tarwin Lower. Michael and Colleen and a small band of assistants have been working away most weeks, making steady progress to the point of more than half of the 5km being sprayed, planted, guarded and mulched. Weeding has been done between planting seasons.

Bald Hills Wind Farm Community
Grants Program has provided a grant of
\$1950 to assist with cost of plants,
guards and mulch. South Gippsland
Shire have donated truckloads of mulch
as well as tree guards toward this
project.

Farmland care= in October we held a working bee at Breen's farm to plant 300 trees. Farmers now give a report at each general meeting, and Anne Box initiated tonight guest speaker to appeal to farm members.

Our Small Grants Project invites farmers and others to apply for up to \$1000 for planting and associated costs. Applications are open until end of June.

Small landholders= Members assisted Michael and his partner with their participation in the Victorian Open Garden Program, including holding a Landcare information stall. Their 15-acre property looked magnificent, after obviously a lot of hard work preparing it for the special weekend. Michael donated \$500 to Landcare group from this activity, thank you very much.

The Small Grants Project offers up to 8 members and town residents the chance to access \$250 to plant indigenous natives in their yards or a community area.

Township spaces= Under the leadership of vice president Michael, we planted in several town community spaces= IGA/café, VB store, church Labyrinth, and plans for school garden and VB park. Potential still exists for mapping of township spaces and habitat, and for identification of significant trees or areas.

Indigenous nursery= Silver Banksia
Nursery folded under that name and
passed to VBCC. Michael continues to
propagate and sell from home but holds
onto his dream of a community-based
semi-commercial nursery in Tarwin

Lower, focusing on indigenous species for revegetation on farms and gardens.

<u>Diversity/education=</u> Our Landcare network offers a wide range of educational events and site visits through the year, for members to gain knowledge and skills.

No formal partnerships at present, but many groups we assist and collaborate with, including Friends of Venus Bay Peninsula Inc., local businesses, school and church.

Wildlife habitat and care= underpins much of our interest. The bike track planting has a goal of providing a corridor for koala movement, as well as other benefits. A future wildlife and habitat expo could be held for community awareness. Small landholders and farmers are all important in providing habitat. Potential still exists for supporting local wildlife carers.

Parks and reserves= ideas were frequently discussed but no specific actions taken. Potential remains for partnerships with the Shire for care of the Fauna Reserve and health centre reserve. Perhaps a longer-term project?

Indigenous and local history= A bunch

quarterly= in October, December and March with executive meetings on the in -between months. Participation at meetings, activities and working bees has been around 5 to 10 members. I hope that people have been able to contribute and benefit in ways that are relevant to them. There is always more to do, but I think our year has been productive.
